designated Caribbean representative of the Dekalb County Complete Count Committee. They will be involved with the Dekalb County Census Caravans scheduled for March 13th, March 20th and March 27th. They will also participate in their Census Night-out scheduled for Thursday, March 19th. The Caribbean Association of Georgia is motivated to continue to ensure that the Caribbean Americans in Georgia are properly identified and that they attain maximum participation in the 2010 Census.
